The National Incident Management System and the NIMS Integration Center



- Homeland Security Presidential Directive 5 ordered the establishment of a National Incident Management System (NIMS).
- NIMS provides a consistent nationwide approach for responding to all kinds of incidents – no matter what the scope, cause or complexity.
- The NIMS Integration Center was established to manage and maintain the NIMS, and to facilitate its adoption nationwide.

The six components of NIMS ...

- Command and Management NIMS incident command and management systems
- Preparedness Necessary components of operational preparedness systems
- Resource Management/Mutual Aid
- Standardized procedures for NIMS resource management processes





The National Incident Management System

The six components of NIMS

- Communications and Information

 Management Establishing common operating framework; accessibility, interoperability
- Supporting Technologies –
 Research and development; technology supporting interoperability and compatibility
- Ongoing Management and
 Maintenance NIMS Integration Center





The National Incident Management System

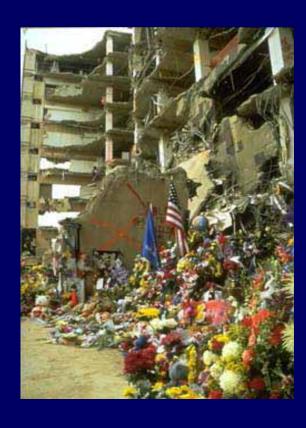


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NIMS Benefits ...

- Standardized organizational structures, processes and procedures
- Standards for planning, training and exercising
- Personnel qualification standards
- Equipment acquisition and certification standards
- Interoperable communications processes, procedures and systems
- Information management systems with a commonly accepted architecture
- Supporting technologies voice and data communications systems, information systems, data display systems, specialized technologies

NIMS and the National Response Plan





- The National Response Plan is based on the NIMS – together they provide the structure that integrates response capabilities and resources into a unified, coordinated national approach to incident management.
- The NRP is a prevention, preparedness, response and recovery plan that provides a concept of operations, incident management actions and responsibilities of incident management partners.
- The NRP forms the basis of how the federal government interfaces with state, local and tribal governments and the private sector.
- It applies to incidents of national significance
 high impact events that require a coordinated response by federal, state, local tribal and nongovernmental entities.
- Not yet finalized

NIMS Implementation and Compliance



- Compliance requirements will be phased in over time.
- Guidance for minimum FY 2005 compliance is under review within DHS and will be released soon.
- FY 2005 is a NIMS ramp-up year. Full NIMS compliance will not be required until the end of FY 2006.
- Everyone is encouraged to familiarize themselves with NIMS concepts take steps to institutionalize the Incident Command System.
- ICS training is available in the states; contact the state emergency management training office.

The NIMS Integration Center – Functions

Director's Office Establishes:



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- Team priorities
- NIC Advisory Committee coordination lines
- Functional Working Group roles
- Coordination lines for other parts of USDHS and external partners (NEMA, IAEM, etc.)
- Coordination line for FEMA management of publications until Publications Management Branch is established



Standards and Resources Branch

- Identifies and promulgates standards
- Identifies and types resources
- Provides phased bases for jurisdictions to review/revise plans to achieve initial NIMS compliance
- Reviews/updates standards and typed resources to ensure use of new technologies and concepts for periodic jurisdiction plan review/revision
- Assists with internal process review



Training and Exercises Branch



- Develops criteria for training curricula and classes
- Develops exercise scenarios and methodologies for incident management
- Assists with performance validation
- Assists with remediation
- Assists with internal process review





System Evaluation and Compliance Branch

- Identifies, evaluates and promulgates systems to be used in NIMS execution
- Develops and manages compliance verification activities
- Recommend, direct and monitor remediation as required for both jurisdictions/constituents and the NIC
- Assists with remediation portion of process
- Assists with internal process review to ensure relevance of the process



Technology, Research and Development Branch



- Identifies, evaluates and promulgates technologies to be used in NIMS execution
- Works with Standards and Resources Branch to ensure maximum use of relevant technologies
- Assists with remediation process
- Assists with internal process review to ensure relevance of the process



The NIMS Integration Center – Implementation

Phase I

- Broker initial feedback and questions on NIMS
- Facilitate development and delivery of NIMS awareness training, education, publications
- Coordinate training, provide guidance and tools on understanding, implementing and complying with the NIMS
- Identify existing capabilities, initiatives, and resources that support the NIMS and the NIC



The NIMS Integration Center – Implementation

Phase I cont.

- Further define the organizational structure, collaborative processes, outreach mechanisms, and support requirements of the full NIC
- Establish the NIC Advisory Committee, functional working groups and program and product input, review, vetting and approval processes
- Develop internal operating guidance and procedures, bring on additional staff
- NIC Director to coordinate all activities with other affected DHS elements or offices as they relate to applicable statutes, HSPD or other relevant authorities as deemed necessary



NIMS Integration Center Resources – NIMS Online Introductory Course

Emergency Management Institute

- NIMS Introductory Course went live online on May 4, 2004 Paper copy coming soon
- 250 students per week being certified by EMI

NIMS Integration Center Initiatives – Mutual Aid Products and Activities

FEMA in collaboration with the NIC...



- Developed a model Intrastate mutual aid agreement for use by states and local jurisdictions – www.emacweb.org
- Supports existing mutual aid efforts through National Emergency Management Agency;
- Funds enhancements to Emergency Management Assistance Compact;
- Supports enhancements to EMAC online system; and
- Supports development of an EMAC training program.



NIMS Integration Center Initiatives – Resource Typing

- Developed methodology for resource typing and inventorying of resources
- Identified subject matter experts by discipline
- Compiled glossary of response assets, including federal response assets
- Initial 60 resources typed and available at <u>www.fema.gov/preparedness/mutual_aid.shtm</u>
- Typing of an additional 120 resources under way, scheduled for release Sept. '04





NIMS Integration Center Initiatives – Standards



Standards Project Components:

- Utilize subject matter experts from all emergency responder communities
- Work with organizations involved in standards development
- Identify and analyze existing standards and critical gaps
- Develop plan to address standards shortfalls
- Develop performance-based standards



NIMS Integration Center Initiatives – Credentialing

FEMA in collaboration with the NIC is working to establish a nationwide credentialing system by:

- Developing a documentation and database system for qualification, certification and credentialing of incident management personnel and organizations;
- Specifying and standardizing roles and responsibilities of first responders operating in emergencies;
- Ensuring that personnel responding to an incident are properly trained and qualified;
- Ensuring the proper identification of responder personnel;
- Providing uniform certification programs so responders can provide mutual aid assistance nationwide;
- Working with existing entities to establish national recognition for multijurisdictional response under mutual aid agreements; and
- Circulating a draft concept paper for a credentialing system within DHS.



The NIMS Integration Center Resources – NIMCAST



- The NIMS Compliance Assurance
 Support Tool is a Web-based selfassessment system that state and local
 governments can use to evaluate their
 incident response and management
 capabilities and comply with NIMS
 requirements.
- A field test of the NIMCAST system will be conducted with states.
- Based on field test results, the instrument will be available for voluntary use nationwide.
